## Career and Transfer Focus

This is a broad area of concentration which prepares you to transfer to a four-year college or university. Graduates with degrees in English may pursue careers in education but are also sought after in other fields such as advertising, public relations, publishing, technical writing, media, law, and public service. The writing and critical thinking skills stressed in upper-level English courses are valued in many other fields as well.

## Three Reasons to Consider the English Track in Liberal Arts: Humanities and Social Science

1. The small class sizes of English classes at SUNY Orange mean you will have greater opportunity for instructor feedback and mentoring.
2. You can fulfill two years of requirements for English majors at lower cost and transfer “seamlessly” to a SUNY university prepared for upper-level English coursework.
3. Following the Registered Track in English prepares you for a variety of programs that emphasize writing, research, reading, and critical thinking. Students in this concentration gain creativity as well as communication and interpersonal skills, qualities sought after by many employers.

## Keep This in Mind

The goal of this registered track is to complete the requirements in two years and maximize transfer opportunities to a four-year institution

You should begin to investigate transfer options early and then work closely with your advisor to select appropriate electives.

Although some students transfer to a four-year program before earning an Associates degree, earning this degree has benefits in transfer options and scholarship opportunities.

If you earn the AA degree, transfer between a two-year SUNY and a four-year SUNY should be a seamless process.

## English Track Gateway Courses:

- Gateway courses: ENG 101, ENG 102
- Key courses: One English survey course (ENG 203, 204, 207, 208, 209, 210, 215, 216, 220, 225, 230, 297); One English genre course (ENG 205, 206, 217, 221, 222, 223, 226, 297)
- Electives: Strongly recommended is a third 200-level English or English craft elective
